New Grammar and meanings for this unit of work

relative clause	A relative clause can be used to give additional information about a noun. They are introduced by a relative pronoun like 'that', 'which', 'who', 'where,' 'why', 'whose'
semi-colons	A semicolon is used, in a single sentence, to link two independent clauses that are closely related.
brackets	Brackets can help you add extra information. Brackets are punctuation marks that are used to enclose words, phrases, or information that is added to a sentence.
colon	The colon has a variety of uses, some of which include introducing a list, introducing an explanation, introducing a quote, and connecting two related sentences.
