History	Year 3	Stone Age to the Iron Age
<p>During this theme You will learn about the period of prehistory in Britain which refers to the time before written records began. It begins when the earliest hunter-gatherers came to Britain from Europe around 450,000 BC and ends with the invasion of the Romans in AD 43.</p>		<p>To know how evidence is gathered about prehistoric Britain.-To develop an understanding of the challenges faced by early humans and tell you why tools were important.- To investigate some of the food that hunter-gatherers would have eaten (fruit, nuts, seeds, veg and lentils).-As archaeologists, to look for evidence to learn about how stone age people used to live and compare to other periods of prehistory.</p>
<p>Prior learning Anything left over from the past is a source of evidence. This is called historical evidence.- evidence we find from the past can be in the form of paintings, skeletons, remains of buildings and sometimes books or pieces of paper.</p>
