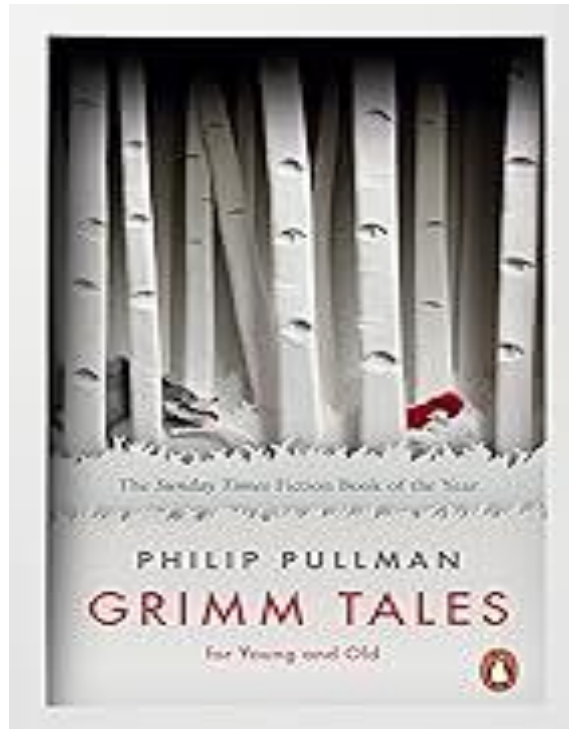


Firebird and Grimm's Fairy Tales.

In Grimm's Fairy Tales, you will read and summarise a selection of stories, comparing the complex themes in in what they read (such as loss or heroism). In this unit of work, you will read different stories, make inferences and explain their reasoning with evidence from the text.

In writing, children will consider character viewpoint and plan write and an alternative ending to a fairy tale. Children will plan and write a comparison of a Grimm Tales version to well-known tales.

Adverbials	Revise the use of adverbials which add detail and link ideas within/between paragraphs.
Semi-colons and colons	Semicolons. Use a semicolon to separate two related independent clauses (clauses that can stand as sentences on their own) that are not linked by a comma and coordinating conjunction (and, but, for, nor, or, yet, and so). ... Colons. Use a colon to introduce a list or introduces an explanation or clause: To separate two closely related clauses, where the second clause explains or expands upon the first.
Split infinitive verbs	An infinitive is a verb preceded by the word to: (to write, to examine, to take, to cooperate).
Parenthesis	A word or phrase inserted into a passage which is grammatically complete without it; in writing it is usually marked by brackets, dashes, or commas.
